## **EMERGENCY GO-KIT RECOMMENDATIONS**

An emergency Go-Kit is a portable collection of emergency supplies and information. Schools should consider the specific characteristics of the school such as population, climate, facilities and resources when preparing an emergency Go-Kit. Go-kits often come in the form of backpacks, buckets or a large duffel bag on wheels that can be easily carried out of a school in case of an emergency. Go-Kits should be stored in secure, readily accessible locations.

The school's emergency plan also should include procedures for designating the PTA or staff responsible for replenishing the emergency Go-Kits with such items as fresh batteries, bottled water, updated phone lists, student rosters, maps, etc.

Administrators, teachers, and members of the school's Incident Command teams may have emergency Go-Kits with supplies needed to carry out their assigned responsibilities. While Go-Kits for these groups are similar, there are some distinctions. For example, classroom Go-Kits could be a "Go-Bucket," which is a five-gallon bucket intended for other storage and, if necessary, lavatory use.

Go-buckets can be assembled and supported by community stakeholders, such as PTA, parents, or other community groups or businesses. Embracing these stakeholders in the process binds the community together in a collective effort for addressing increased safety in school and the community at large.
